## Better Beginnings Family Literacy Program

Good reading and literacy skills are not only an essential foundation for performance in formal education, but also a pre-requisite for successful participation in all areas of adult life and research consistently shows that an early exposure to books and stories substantially contributes to success in early literacy.

In Western Australia, public libraries will be at the hub of a new program developed by the State Library of Western Australia called *Better Beginnings*, an innovative and unique family literacy program to assist parents to develop the early literacy skills of their children. Stage One of the program has recently been launched in Gosnells, Mandurah, Midland, Carnarvon, Halls Creek and Kalgoorlie, the six communities participating in phase one of the State Government's Early Years Strategy.

The program consists of a series of linked initiatives developed to encourage parents to share books and stories with their babies and to establish life-long links with libraries. Edith Cowan University has agreed to work with the State Library to comprehensively evaluate the program.

In the six communities participating in Stage One of the program, the parents of every baby born will receive a 'literacy toolkit' when they visit a community health centre for their baby's six week health check. The kit contains a board book, a growth chart featuring favourite nursery rhymes, a list of the best books to share with young children and supporting material to encourage reading and literacy activities in the home.

Other components of the program have been developed to build on the impact of these 'toolkits' and to link families to the life-long learning opportunities offered by public libraries. Public libraries will host a series of rhymetime and storytime sessions for babies as well as 'pram jams' where early childhood specialists will meet with parents to talk about literacy, speech and language development, play and other topics central to healthy child development. The libraries are also developing Family Reading Centres as an inclusive welcoming place for families to visit and spend time with their children. These will bring together books for young children as well as parenting information and feature resources to encourage early literacy.

Stage One of *Better Beginnings* will pave the way for the opportunity of a state-wide initiative in 2005 to provide the best possible start in life of all Western Australian children.

## **Dianella Library Mosaic – January 2004**

A CANWA grant of \$2,000 has allowed Dianella Library and local primary school students to create a stunning community mosaic art installation for the entrance walkway to the Library. The artwork was designed by local artist and Dianella Library Technician, Annie Q Medley, and features local flora and fauna in the Dianella region.

Library staff enlisted the aid of professional mosaic artists Chris James and Renee Martin, from MosaicArt to work with students from a local primary school, to complete the project.

The project was completed in November 2003, having involved Year 6 students and parents from Our Lady's Assumption Primary School, adjacent to the Dianella Library.

“The support from parents and the local business community has been amazing”, said Clare Duxbury, one of the librarians coordinating the project. “Nearly all of our materials have been donated, thanks to the generosity of local businesses including BGC Construction, Dianella Plaza Shopping Centre Management, Bunnings Inglewood, Federation Tile Factory, and Tiles Expo.”

The artwork was launched in December with sponsors, students and proud parents admiring their mosaic which has improved the visual appearance of the library and attracted more people into the library.

## Net Notes: Directories of Electronic Journals

The day I found out that there was a journal called *Hamlet Studies* was the day I realised that the publish or perish imperative had gone too far. There are too many journals but, rather than lament the death of yet another forest to produce or print articles from increasingly esoteric journals and the impossibility of keeping up with the literature, it is more productive to use directories of electronic journals to identify the good quality journals of relevance to you. There are a number of directories available, some focusing only on scholarly journals and some with a much wider focus. A few of these directories are described below:

Australian Journals Online: The National Library's Database of Australian Electronic Journals

<http://www.nla.gov.au/ajol/>

The name says it all.

Directory of Open Access Journals

<http://www.doaj.org/>

This currently covers 766 journals which meet the selection criteria of being full-text, open access scholarly journals. The clear interface makes it easy to search by title or subject.

Scholarly Journals Distributed Via the World Wide Web

<http://info.lib.uh.edu/wj/webjour.html>

This has similar criteria to the Directory of Open Access Journals but does not have as many titles and has not been recently updated. It is part of the University of Houston Libraries website.

Electronic Journal Miner

<http://ejournal.coalliance.org/>

This has a rather bilious looking colour scheme, approximately 8000 titles, and is very broad in its coverage, with everything from the abdomen (*Abdominal Imaging*) to zooplankton (*Journal of Plankton Research*) regardless of whether it is free or fee.

NewJour (New Journal and Newsletter Announcement List for new serials on the Internet)

<http://gort.ucsd.edu/newjour/>

NewJour lists over 13000 items, and serves as a means of announcing new electronic journals and newly established electronic versions of paper journals. It has a large quantity of data but there are a couple of caveats: it has been running for around a decade so some of the entries are out of date, and there is no subject index.

PubMed Central

<http://www.pubmedcentral.nih.gov/>

PubMed Central offers an archive of life science journals in full text. The archive does not go back further than the 1990s for most of the journals covered but does offer all issues of the *Bulletin of the Medical Library Association* from 1911 onwards.

Electronic Journals Library

<http://rzblx1.uni-regensburg.de/ezeit/index.phtml?bibid=AAAAA&colors=7&lang=en>

One of the more substantial directories available, this covers over 18000 journals and uses traffic light colours to clearly indicate which ones offer full text and which ones are subscriber only. As the url indicates, it is a German website maintained by the University of Regensburg, but has an English version and mainly covers English language journals.

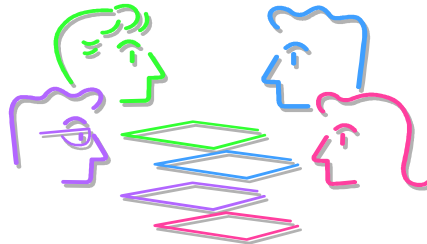

## Who wouldn't want to come to Albany for the Oral History Conference?

As you probably know, Albany was the first European settlement in Western Australia (1826), three years earlier than the Swan River Colony. So it is jam-packed with history. The conference itself will be held in the Old Post Office (a heritage-listed building), which is now the University of Western Australia Albany Centre. All around you in the centre of town there are old buildings and streetscapes, which evoke Albany's position as premier seaport of WA until 1900.

You'll be able to walk around the CBD to the conference venue and to many different restaurants and shops from your accommodation. There will also be opportunities to visit historic venues like the WA Museum – Albany in the Residency Building, the Colonial Gaol, the National Trust property of the Old Farm at Strawberry Hill, the Princess Royal Fortress, St. John's Anglican Church (1848), and Australia's only whaling museum, Whaleworld, set in the original whaling station.

The natural beauty of the southern coastline and the Princess Royal Harbour is world-renowned. If you can extend your visit, there are many historic and scenic attractions in the Denmark and Mount Barker areas that complement the environment, the seasonal wildflowers, and the many new wineries.
