Your library needs NEW books

The WA Local Government Librarians Association [WALGLA] and the peak body for councils in WA [WALGA] are running a campaign to improve funding for public library stock. The State has two responsibilities in the partnership that delivers library service to the people of WA. One is to provide a base stock at 1.25 items per capita, and the other is to maintain that stock by regular injections of new stock so that the local librarians can withdraw stock that is out-of-date, read out or worn out.

The State, through SLWA, has been loyal to the per capita standard, and – statewide – the figure hovers around 1.1. But by meeting, at least partially, the needs of population growth without the additional funding to match it, their other responsibility has been neglected.

The maintenance standard has fallen badly. Long experience has shown that stock is well maintained if 15% of it is replaced with new items, annually. Translated into shelf life for the three main categories (eg Junior items 5 years) this standard is embedded in the 1994 Library Board of WA policy document *Provision of Resources for Public Libraries*. The new item maintenance provision in 2002/2003 for almost all the metropolitan libraries was below 7%, which means that each item must last on average 15 years. For many libraries, shelves are full, but the proportion of old items past their use-by date is far too high.

The integrity of WA's public libraries is at stake; it is not possible to offer excellent service with so much out-of-date material on the shelves. So drop into your local library where you will almost certainly find a display with confronting messages, and draft letters to politicians, bumper stickers, etc. Or visit the WALGA website (<http://www.walga.asn.au/>) and go to the campaign pages.

Please help the public librarians improve the public library service in WA – you never know when you might need it!

ALIA Local Liaison Officer (LLO)

As part of ALIA's commitment to enhance the engagement of members across the country, the Board resolved to appoint Local Liaison Officers in each state. I was asked whether I would be prepared to assist the Association and its members in this way and appointed in August 2003. Since then, I have had the opportunity to work with and meet a number of new and long standing ALIA members.

ALIA local liaison officers are responsible for promoting ALIA and supporting members at a grassroots level. As the local liaison officer for Western Australia, I am committed to work with groups to undertake the following activities:

- Facilitate the exchange of information and other communications between group office bearers and National Office staff
- Facilitate communication and coordination between local groups
- Provide advice for group office bearers in Western Australia
- Help coordinate promotional activities with groups, including membership recruitment drives, and promotional activities, for example Library and Information Week
- Act as the ALIA representative in the state which includes being a point of contact for members and non members and lobbying (in association with the Executive Director and key individuals in the profession in Western Australia).

Since I was appointed, I have worked with ALIA West to facilitate a workshop with longstanding members of the profession and the current office bearers, run a workshop for local ALIA members which provided input to the Review of Member Engagement and Participation being undertaken by Susan Magnay in the National Office, and provided information about ALIA membership and education for the profession in Western Australia to people who have contacted me via telephone and email. I also contacted the *West Australian* to have librarianship as a career featured in the 'My Job' section of the paper where the outcome was the excellent article on Simon and Andrew Lewis on Saturday 3 April, 2004.

As the local liaison officer I do not usurp or override the work of ALIA groups. They remain independent to run their activities and programmes as they wish. However, I am here to assist any groups in any of the ways listed above.

I will shortly be offering to convene a meeting of Group Treasurers so that we can share experiences and discuss the new Treasurer's kit which has recently been sent out by Pam Fedorow, the National Office Finance Officer.

My background in ALIA is that I am a Fellow of the Association and have in excess of forty years membership, have held a number of office bearer roles in both Western Australia and nationally and am committed to the work of the Association and its objectives.

I am one of six local liaison officers appointed by ALIA and we share communications with each other and National Office on a regular basis. We also met at the National Policy Congress in 2003 and suggested that due to the length of time we have all been involved in the profession and the Association, perhaps we should be known as TOTs instead of LLOs. What does TOTs stand for? - Tired Old Tarts!

Ali Sharr on the importance of new book stock

"On my trip around the other States, I noticed that in many cases when additional books were added to an existing library as a result of State subsidy, the appearance of the library was little changed because, naturally, the new books were promptly borrowed and the tired, old ones stayed on the shelves. That was the main reason for our policy that, when an existing library became associated with us, all its existing books were vested in the Board, removed and replaced by new stock, as if there had been no previous library. I am sure that that was a major factor in the rapid increase of use of such libraries." (p.78)

ARL Student Awards Night

Each year the Academic and Research Libraries (ARL) WA Group of ALIA presents awards to library studies students at final year undergraduate or graduate diploma level at Edith Cowan University, Curtin University of Technology, and Perth Central Metropolitan College of TAFE. At the end of the academic year students are nominated by academic staff from each of the participating institutions.

Two prize categories are available. In the first category, one student from each institution receives a book prize, sponsored by DA Information Services, to the value of \$100. The criterion for the DA Information Services prize is an essay topic or presentation with a research component.

The second prize category is awarded to the top student in a practicum undertaken at a University or Research institution. The prize, a cheque to the value of \$100, is sponsored by Blackwells Book Services.

This year, the student presentations and awards night was held on Tuesday 23rd March 2004. The venue was at Edith Cowan University Mount Lawley Campus, and attended by 40 people. As Convenor of ARL, it was my pleasure to present the student awards to four very worthy recipients.

The three ARL/ DA Information Services student awards for best essays in 2003 went to:

Leanne Fisher – Perth Central Metropolitan College of TAFE

Richard Maker – Edith Cowan University.

Peter Pierre – Curtin University of Technology

The ARL/Blackwells Book Services best student practicum prize for 2003 was presented to Lucia Ravi from Edith Cowan University.

The three prize winners for best essays were then invited to present their research topics. Leanne Fisher bravely volunteered to speak first. Her topic was on networked services in the library. She focussed on Royal Perth Hospital Library, where she had been working part time, and studying. Leanne's paper and powerpoint presentation evaluated possible new information sources that could be added to RPH Library's existing information network.

Peter Pierre provided some insight into his essay topic "The future of research libraries: post-modern Lazarus". He is currently doing further research for his Masters, which advances on his essay theme. At the conclusion of formal proceedings, Peter was happy to expand on the work he is undertaking for his Masters subject.

Finally, Richard Maker gave an entertaining talk on his essay topic, entitled "Something borrowed, something blue: Libraries in the digital age". Richard considered the future of public libraries in Australia, and the role of librarians who must act as information navigators for their clients. Without this assistance, people risk drowning in an excess of information available.

ARL's icebreaker and student awards night was a very enjoyable event, and we received positive feedback from everyone involved. The committee is busy planning more exciting events in 2004, so stay tuned for further details.
