But the main event was the presentation of the 2003 Sharr Medal. The nominees present were Kelly Underwood, Richard Maker, and Andrew Rayner, with two nominees, Titus Mercea and Peter Pierre unable to attend. The winner was Andrew Rayner and we all wish him well in his career.

ALIA Board of Directors

My final report covers the meeting held 20th May, the new Board also met the following day. The two main issues from the 20th May meeting were the Federal budget report and the Review of Members Engagement.

Federal budget information was provided to members via ALIANews and this budget will have little impact on ALIA or the Library sector. Visit the website for the summary <http://alia.org.au/publishing/budget.analysis/>

The report of the review of member engagement and participation in ALIA, which is part of initiative A from the ALIA 2003-2004 Plan, provided much "food for thought" and discussion by the Board. A summary of the key issues will be published soon in *Incite*, a further paper outlining the Board's response and outcomes of this review will be forthcoming.

I attended the AGM on Thursday night and the main agenda item was the motion regarding the future of the Asia Pacific Special Health & Law Librarians conference. The motion was defeated and a second motion encouraging Special Librarians to bring a conference proposal to the Board as soon as possible was passed. The second motion supports the current conference structure, which allows members to submit proposals for conferences as required. The only change from the previous conference structure is that the Asia Pacific Special Health & Law Librarians conference does not occur automatically. The new conference structure provides greater flexibility and the ability to change and adapt to our information needs. The motion only refers to Special Librarians, as ALIA has no jurisdiction over independent organisations such as the Australian Law Librarians' Group. This does not mean that health and law cannot be involved in any future conference proposal. Minutes from the AGM will be available soon on ALIANet.

I have enjoyed my term on the ALIA Board of Directors but it is time to hand the baton on. I would like to wish all the best to Carol as she joins the Board, and to Imogen during her Presidential year.

ADVANCED SEARCHING SKILLS WORKSHOP CENTRAL TAFE 1 MAY 2004

On the first of May the WA Library Technician Group hosted an Advanced Internet Searching Skills Workshop at Central Tafe. The presenter was Judy Clayden from Edith Cowan University. The 24 participants came from several sectors of the library world including schools, academic and special/government libraries.

A handout was provided which gave an introduction and review of basic searching techniques. The participants were encouraged to consider:

- The type of information required i.e. general or specific information.
- Document type i.e. web page, technical report or news item.
- Selection of appropriate Internet mediums i.e. search engine, database vendor or reference tool.

Other areas covered included advanced searching options in standard search engines, meta-search engines, specialised search engines, directories (general and specialized subject), portals, vortals, gateways and the Invisible Web.

Resources provided included the addresses of Web based tutorials, popular search engines and a list of references for further reading.

Exercises were provided to give "hands on experience", some of which were very challenging and funny.

The workshop proved to be so popular that the places were soon filled and we are planning a repeat later in the year.

Topics suggested for a future workshop included:

- A repeat of the same workshop [hoping to manage more second time around]
- Web authoring
- Web page designing
- Searching for government reports, legislation and law reports

Special Libraries Reality Check

Jane Edinger will be well known to many of us through her activities with ALIA. She has been a member of the Biblia editorial team, co-ordinator of Library and Information Week 2001, and is an ALIA silver pin recipient. Jane has worked in the library industry since her graduation from Curtin University in 1990. Her first job was at a law library in Queensland and she has since worked in the health, engineering and resource sectors. She has held positions in both the government sector and private enterprise. During her career Jane has taken a break from traditional library work to work as a web site developer and has run her own information services consultancy. As Jane says, "It's been a varied ride to date". All these experiences have come to fruition in her book entitled *Reality Check - the pocket guide to special librarianship*.

The book is based on Jane's and her colleagues' experiences in the 'real world' of special libraries. I asked Jane what prompted her to write the book. She replied "I think the prompt was writing procedures for the information service I'm currently employed in, which made me reflect on what I know and how I came to know it. This led me to think about how little I knew when I came out of library school, how much wisdom I had accumulated since then and how important it is for everyone of us to share what we know."

In writing the book Jane states that she started with a framework of relevant facts and filled in the framework with text. She showed the first draft to her colleagues and received suggestions on what should be added. One of the features of the book is the "reality checks" scattered throughout. These are drawn from Jane's and her colleagues' experiences. As Jane says "The book isn't really by me, I just put the words together, it is actually a work of collective consciousness - I just haven't named all the individuals who contributed (thanks to everyone I talked with or who provided suggestions, feedback or reality checks)."

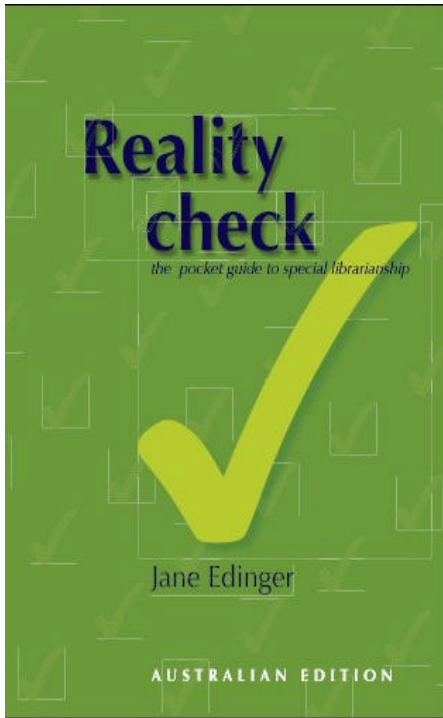
The book is 'Australian-centric' in that the suggested resources and services recommended are Australian companies and products. Jane has titled the book 'Australian Edition' so that any overseas purchasers are aware that the book refers to the Australian library environment.

Jane anticipates the book will become a "must have" for graduates entering the world of libraries particularly in the corporate sector, as it provides answers to the demands of managing information centres. Jane also hopes that the book could be useful to those already in the industry by providing pointers to resources they may not be aware exist, or by bringing particular tips or ideas to their notice.

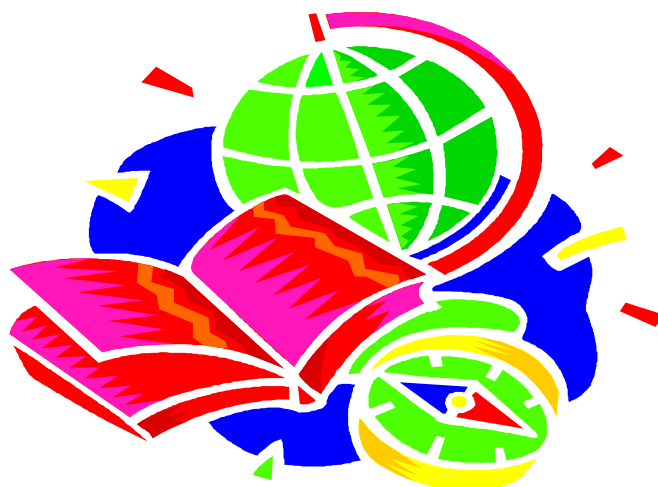

@your library – Curtin delivers flexible service

The Curtin Library and Information Service is becoming increasingly flexible in the way it provides services to clients. A new service being trialled allows clients to send ‘SMS’ queries to the library.

The concept of SMS (Short Message Service) reference queries was raised as a possible extension of the Library’s existing virtual reference service. “Mobile phones are ubiquitous and accessible, and SMS provides students with a very popular way of communicating,” said John Frylinck, Acting University Librarian. “Since the student population at Curtin University of Technology has clearly embraced mobile phone culture and SMS technology ‘SMS a Query’ offers another way of servicing our large client base.”

In addition, an environmental scan concluded that there is little (if any) evidence that an SMS library reference service exists elsewhere in Australia. A successful trial may lead into a new method of service delivery for libraries throughout Australia. Student feedback indicates a high satisfaction level with SMS queries with 100% indicating they would use the service again. “What a good idea. It’s less expensive and time-consuming than going online to search for an answer to a simple query,” said one student. “Very beneficial to all students and staff. The answer was prompt and the service highly satisfactory. I hope the service will keep going. Viva librarians!” said another.

SMS enables those with GSM mobile phones to send text messages of up to 160 characters to other GSM mobile phones. Technology is now also available to receive text-based SMS messages via a computer interface – and this is how Library staff receive SMS messages from clients. SMS messages sent to the Library arrive in the form of an email, and can be replied to easily in the same format. Email replies sent are then received by the client in the form of an SMS message.

There are several benefits of providing an SMS service this way. Some of these include:

- As reference desk staff are familiar with using email, minimal training is required.
- Receiving SMS messages via an email account provides options for tracking incoming and outgoing messages.
- As SMS is asynchronous, queries can be dealt with at the convenience of reference desk staff, and, as a result, the SMS service can be staffed using existing reference resources.

So now staff and students can contact the Library any time, from any location, and ask any library related question – and the Library will aim to respond to their SMS query within an hour (while the Library is open).

espace@Curtin

The Library and Information Service at Curtin University is piloting a new initiative to increase the impact and visibility of the University's researchers. Research staff and students can place their pre- and post-published material into espace@Curtin <http://espace.lis.curtin.edu.au> – an institutional repository based on the protocols of the Open Archives Initiative. (<http://www.openarchives.org>). The repository is amongst a small number of similar initiatives in the Australian library sector, and the first in Western Australia. The metadata of records in the repository is harvested and aggregated into search engines of academic research material, thus providing an alternative, open access method of sharing research output. Julie Woodland, of the library's e-Library Development Unit, is developing the pilot phase during 2004, assisting research staff to explore this new paradigm in scholarly communication.

@Your Library Campaign - City of Perth

City of Perth librarians responded to the statewide @your library campaign by promoting sections of the library stock using the theme "Your Future@your library". This was achieved by means of "Foo" characters peering from the top of shelves in diverse subject areas and pointing from a sign "Your future is here". A booklist of varied titles containing the word future was also created to complement a book display. The display was so popular that book stocks ran low!
