Celebrating Library and Information Week with Authors at the City of Stirling Libraries

This year, Stirling Libraries took advantage of the State Literature Centre's "Writers in Libraries" programme. Six authors were booked during Library and Information Week. Shaun Tan, Mike Lefroy, Liz Byrski, Kim Scott, Estelle Blackburn and John Long entertained and informed each of their audiences. The following reviews were received:

Estelle Blackburn, Scarborough Library

Estelle's book *Broken Lives* relates the story of John Button's wrongful imprisonment for manslaughter. Estelle was excellent and had everyone fascinated with her accounts of her investigations and the background to the case. A comment from one of the audience: "could have sat another couple of hours to listen to her - excellent speaker". I would highly recommend her to anyone interested in investigative journalism at its best.

Liz Byrski, Mirrabooka Library

Liz Byrski is a writer and broadcaster, and the author of many books. She has just published her first fiction novel, *Gang of Four*. Liz was a wonderful presenter. The small group interacted throughout the session with their own stories and writing ideas. Liz spoke about the differences between fiction and non-fiction. She also spoke about how the characters in her fiction book weaved their own web through the book, rather than the path she thought they were going to take. Liz is such a friendly and relaxed person that everyone that attended thoroughly enjoyed listening and talking to her.

Mike Lefroy, Inglewood Library

Mike Lefroy has written many books for kids using his interest in the maritime history of Western Australia and proved to be an excellent presenter. He gave a fantastic talk about the research and processes that went into uncovering the mystery of the *Shipwreck at Madmen's Corner*. He also spoke about some of the other shipwrecks that have occurred off the WA coast, and gave a rundown on new books he's working on. A fascinating insight into WA maritime adventures.

John Long, Karrinyup Library

John Long is the Curator of Vertebrate Palaeontology at the WA Museum, and has written fiction and non-fiction for children and adults. John talked about the perils of publishing, and the initial difficulties he faced getting his works published. He talked at length about his love of dinosaurs and fossils, how this passion evolved, and how it came to shape his career and his writing. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the presentation, and stayed on to chat "all things science" with John over a cup of tea.

Kim Scott, Osborne Library

Kim Scott is a descendant of the people who lived along the south-east coast of WA, and his books, *True Country* and *Benang* have been critically acclaimed. Those that attended the session were very impressed with Kim and what he had to say. One of the group said "he had a very nice viewpoint on his ancestral heritage" and "he was very well-spoken and educated."

Shaun Tan, Dianella Library

Shaun's picture books, among them *The Red Tree*, *The Rabbits*, and *The Lost Thing*, have won national and international acclaim. Shaun spoke for nearly an hour and a half on his work as both an illustrator and a writer. As many of the audience had an art background he spoke in detail on the varying techniques for different books, right down to the mediums used, the inspiration behind the ideas and why he used a particular style or medium. Another wonderful insight into the mind of a creative genius!

All those that the sessions attended gained new insight into the world of writing and publishing. Readers were able to discover an extra dimension to the books on the shelves at their local library, and that, after all, is what Library and Information Week is all about.

Celebrating much newer writers, the presentation ceremony for the City of Stirling's 2004 Student Literary Award was also held during Library and Information Week. The "Slice of Life" theme invited students to write about their own lives using a variety of topics, such as food, sport and holidays. The entries were then reproduced



as a book called "Slice of Life", comparing children's lives in the past with their lives now. Information about the past was taken from oral history interviews. The book links in with the 175th anniversary of the Swan River settlement, and copies of the book will be available at all the libraries. Every school in the City of Stirling will also receive a copy.

276 entries were received from 18 schools across the City of Stirling. Councillor Sam Popovski was the MC for the presentation, and the certificates and vouchers were presented by Deputy Mayor Troy Pickard to students from Deanmore Primary School, Holy Rosary Primary School, Carmel Primary School, Wembley Downs Primary School, Balga Senior High School, Balcatta Senior High School, St Andrew's Grammar School and Servite College. Every student that entered the Awards received a Certificate of Participation, and all award winners were also presented with their own copy of the "Slice of Life" book.

All in all, Library and Information Week 2004 was a busy and interesting celebration of stories for the six City of Stirling Libraries and their readers.

WA Public Libraries to Receive Extra Funding

The State Government will provide West Australian public libraries with an extra \$10.3 million in an attempt to bring relief to the deteriorating shape libraries are in at the moment. Although details of how the funds will be spent are not yet released, the action gives much satisfaction to the Western Australian Local Governments Association (WALGA) who, in conjunction with the Western Australian Local Government Librarians Association, had been campaigning against the state for extra funds.

WALGA's Deputy President, Cr Bill Mitchell, said "Our campaign highlighted the need for adequate public library funding to address the decline in standard and numbers of library resources."

According to WALGA and the W.A Librarians Association, up to now the state has been contributing \$12 million worth of funds per year, while local government has provided public libraries with up to \$45 million in funds each year, more than triple the funds coming from the state.

Community Policy Manager for WALGA, Michelle Mackenzie said "the lack of state funding for public libraries is part of a bigger issue, the state government shifts the cost of service provisions onto local government."

Ms Mackenzie also said "as state government funding lessens local government is expected to pick up the tab."

President of the W.A Local Governments Librarians Association, Patricia Walker said, "libraries play a vital community service, and are a core provider of cultural and educational services to all Western Australians."

"Public Libraries not only provide books but equitable access to services such as email and the internet, story-time sessions for toddlers and children, local history collections, resources for people with disabilities and deliveries for household residents." "Obviously libraries do not have the same high level of public exposure as health, education and law and order, so this campaign has done a lot to raise the awareness and profile of public libraries," Ms Walker said.

The campaign highlighted the lack of access Western Australians have had to new information services and also the state's cultural and educational services as a result of insufficient funding from the state.

The State Library Board Act regulates that public libraries must carry 1.25 items of stock per capita. Along with this libraries must also replace 15% of stock per year so as to ensure up to date and current editions of books and technology.

According to an analysis of *Public Library Funding Resource,s* undertaken by the W.A Local Governments Librarians Association in January of this year, the current state-wide average of items per person is 1.16. This is falling well below the standard required. A spokesperson for WALGA has said that, "the government is purchasing only a fraction of necessary resources for public libraries, too few titles and too few copies of these." Ms Walker said areas of high growth such as Mandurah and Wanneroo had been experiencing problems meeting the 1.25 quota and that this was a real issue for the public libraries.

The analysis also reviewed replacement rates, which last met the 15% requirement in 1995 and has since dropped each year. In 2002 only 9.8% of stock was replenished. WALGA hope that with the long-awaited extra funds stock levels will reach the required amount and will at least allow for a 12% replacement rate.

However Ms Walker said the extra funds would not be enough to meet the standards required by the State Library Board. "We are still not sure of the level of replacement stock this money will provide and how close it will bring us to the 1.25 items per head of population. At a guess, it will probably be somewhere around 10-11% new books input but still under 1.2 items per head of population," Ms Walker added.

Much of the stock in W.A's public libraries is way past its use by date. Ms Walker hopes the majority of the funds will be spent on the turnover of stock. She said the average shelf life of books should be seven years however at present books are spending up to 15 years on the shelf, going way passed the suggested seven year mark.

The Western Australian Local Governments Librarians Association along with WALGA is now working towards signing an agreement with the state to ensure continuation of the forward movement of libraries after the extra funds have been spent. "Graphs of library funding over the last 20 years or so show that the state government funding for public library stock has been on a steady decline," Ms Walker said.

Ms Walker also said that lobbying and campaigning when funds are low always seems to create a reaction from the state, which then provides extra finances. "We are hoping that a five year agreement will take these highs and lows out of the funding."

present the state is responsible for providing libraries with funding for books in differing types of print and also audio books on tapes, CD or DVD and video. The state's funds also go toward consultancy and advisory services as well as training. Local governments have been providing public libraries with the buildings, technological communications, staff and local resources. It is understood that with some of the state's additional funds extra staff will be employed to help with the processing of new resources.

Pauline Hodson of Spearwood, is co-ordinator of Learning Resource Services at Challenger TAFE in Beaconsfield.

Pauline arrived in Western Australia in 1987 determined to begin a new professional career.

She enrolled in a Bachelor of Applied Science (Library and Information Studies) at Curtin University and was soon representing the student association at the Australian Library and Information Association WA branch meetings.

Since graduation, Pauline has belonged to a number of ALIA committees and is currently a facilitator of the graduate mentoring committee which helps new library graduates make the transition from university to professional life. She is passionate about information literacy and in her role at TAFE aims to provide the highest level of service in a professional and ethical manner.

GWEN BUCH

Gwen Buch, of Rossmoyne, is a project manager with the Department of Conservation and Land Management. Gwen studied part-time at Curtin University while raising two small children.

She was a consistently high achiever, earning a place on the Vice-Chancellor's list (the top one per cent of undergraduate students) seven times and graduating with the John Dean Award for academic excellence.



Gwen began working for CALM in 2002 and has worked on several major projects based on establishing compliance with the State Records Act 200, the most innovative of which has been an online recordkeeping awareness training package.

Known as RAT, this project won CALM the Records and Information Management Liaison Group Excellence in Records Management Award in 2003. It is also being implemented at five other government agencies.

Maria was born in Portugal and migrated to Africa at the age of three. She migrated to Australia in 1977 after having lived in Mozambique and Rhodesia.

Maria began her career in microfilming and over the next 17 years worked in the micrographics industry in both the public and private sectors.

In 1990, she juggled full time employment to undertake a Bachelor of Arts degree in history at Murdoch University.

Maria currently works as a member of the Reference Team at the State Records Office where she liaises with genealogists, historians and professional researchers to assist clients with their daily information requests. She has become proficient at locating misplaced records as well as discovering facts from obscure information. When the WA Museum requested information about a tin band it had in its possession, Maria's commitment to research led her to the discovery of a story that connected the tin band, found in South Beach, to thirteen French sailors stranded off the coast of Madagascar.

Maria regularly organises tours of the State Library for visiting groups, tailored to their specific requirements, to promote awareness of the importance of archives and their value and place in today's society and has also been responsible for researching and selecting display material for the State Records Office Search Room.
